# Child labor that the international law prohibits

Is divided into three categories:

Work performed by a child under the minimum age for such work ( according to national legislation and international standards), the type of work that interferes with the child's education or health development.

"Hazardous child labor" refers to any type of work that can harm a child's physical or mental health due to its nature or working conditions.

Slavery, human trafficking, or bonded labor, as well as other forms of forced labor, such as the use of children in armed conflicts, prostitution, pornography, and other illegal activities, are the worst forms of child labor.

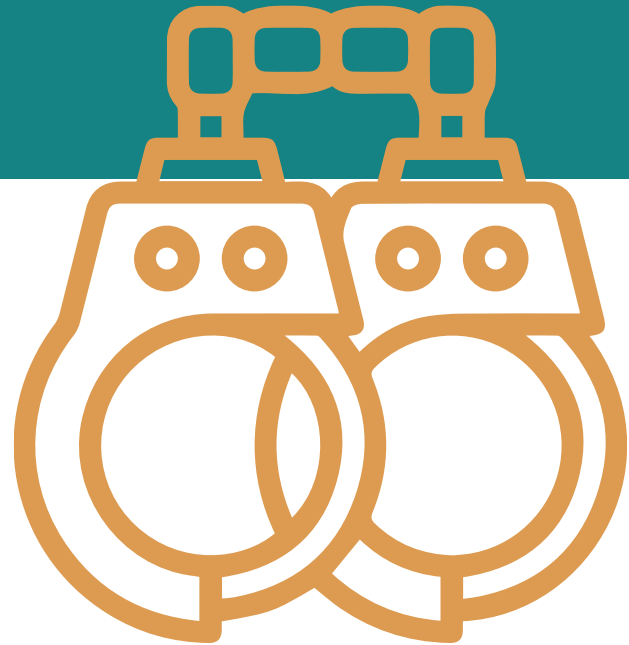

## Human Trafficking Definition

Human Trafficking is: the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of people through force, fraud or deception, with the aim of exploiting them for profit.

### Penalties

According to the law, anyone who commits the crime of human trafficking faces up to 15 years in prison or a fine of up to one million riyals, or both.



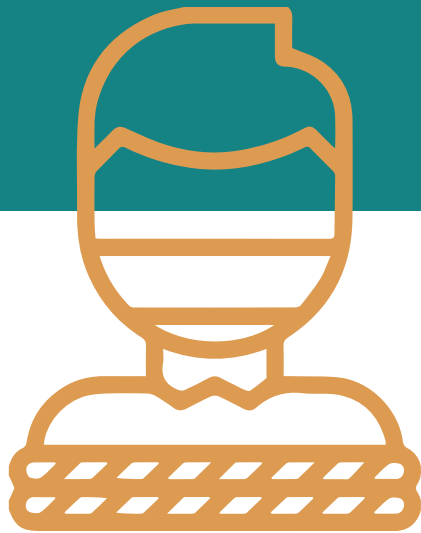

The victim's consent of the forced exploitation is irrelevant when using any of the "means"

Means like: threatening, using force, kidnapping, deception, authority misuse or exploit weaknesses.

Victims are prone to various forms of exploitation, like: prostitution, forced labor, begging, crime, domestic slavery, forced marriage, marriage of minors, and removal of organs.

# Did You Know



There are approximately 27 million victims of human trafficking in the world today (including 1.2 million children), which is the highest recorded number in history.

# Did You Know



If you suspect a potential victim of human trafficking, you should ask yourself the following questions:

- Is the person afraid or hesitant to share information?
- Is he confused?
- Is there any evidence of food, sleep, or health-care deprivation, or of a lack of any of the basic needs?
- Is his liberty restricted?
- Is he a foreign worker who does not carry an identification or passport?

If you answered yes to two or more questions, you may be dealing with a potential victim of human trafficking.

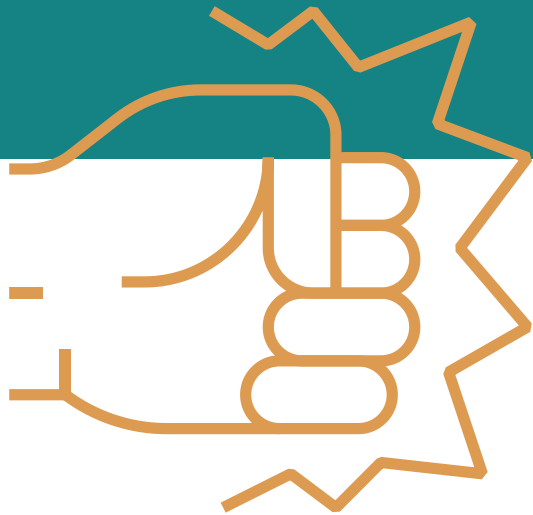


Human trafficking is a crime that feeds off people's vulnerabilities in order to exploit them.

Human trafficking, as defined by the Palermo Protocol, consists of three elements:

- **The Act** - the recruitment, transport, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons.
- **The Mean** (the methods)- threatening, deception or otherwise.
- **The Purpose** which is always exploitation of the victim.

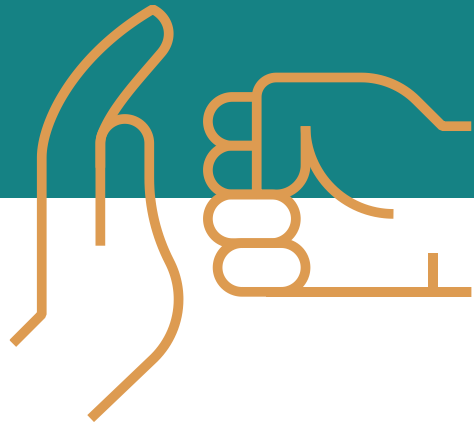


Human trafficking is exploiting men, women, and children by using violence, deception, or force.

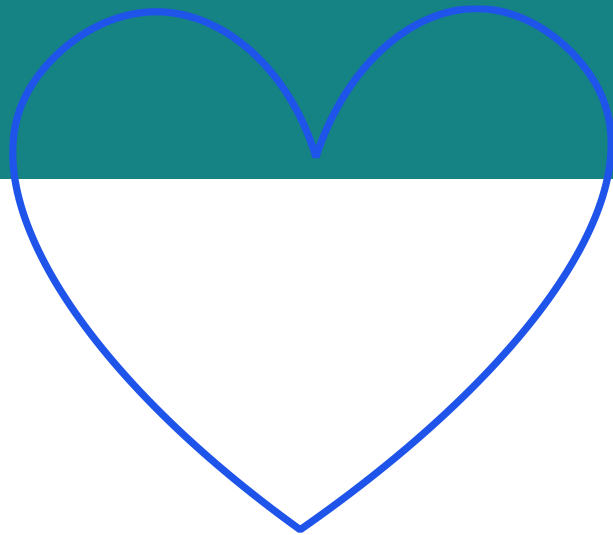
The 30<sup>th</sup> of July is the world day against human trafficking proclaimed by the united nations general assembly.
